Warrensville Emergency Alerts System

The City of Warrensville Heights launched a new citywide emergency notification system called **ReadyNotify** in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Office of Emergency Management. The system is used by 21 other participating municipalities to issue notifications to residents and businesses of emergency situations and provide information about necessary actions.

ReadyNotify is primarily used for emergency notifications when rapid and accurate information is essential for your immediate safety; however you may choose to be notified of general City of Warrensville Heights News as well.

Participating in the ReadyNotify Program is voluntary. A valid email and phone number will be needed to sign-up. During the registration process we will ask you to give us information about yourself such as your address, your primary language, and if you require any special assistance during an emergency event. When you sign-up in the system, you will receive emails as well as have the opportunity to choose how you want to receive additional messages.

New Commercial Projects

Northfield Corridor Demolition Underway

The Northfield Corridor (4557 lot size 123,524 square feet and 4499 lot size 194,035 square feet) demolition is underway to clear the bass buildings. This project is a partnership between the Cuyahoga County Land Reutilization and Office of Community and Economic Development. The City's vision is to redevelop the area for mix-use commercial, residential development, park setting, and much more.

Heinen's Fine Foods, Inc.

Construction of a new 60,000 square feet free standing food production facility with state-of-the-art equipment, refrigeration and onsite production.

Lifebanc

Expansion of existing building with a new 20,800 square feet addition to consolidate and centralize operations in Warrensville Heights.

Allen Renzi/ORG Management

Plans approved to construct a 30,000 square feet building. The proposed building would be 30 feet in height. The Renzi Gymnastics Academy would occupy 20,000 square feet of the building. The remaining 10,000 would be available for lease.

Jack Entertainment/Thistledown Racetrack

Approval to erect a new 15,504 square feet horse barn with 48 horse stalls, track room, wash rack and restroom facilities.

Audit

The City received an unqualified opinion (clean opinion) for its 2015 Audited Financial Statements. The City was also awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) for fiscal year ended December 31, 2014 for its comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR). This Award is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

The audit for fiscal year ending December 31, 2015 was conducted by James G. Zupka, C.P.A., Inc. The Finance Department, with the assistance of Ciuni & Panichi, Inc., an independent Certified Public Accountant and Business Advisory Firm, prepared the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2015.

Income Tax Department

The Income Tax Department is moving from its current City Hall location to the Civic and Senior Center located at 4567 Green Road. We will continue to offer the same types of service and face-to-face assistance in the new office and serve the taxpayers of Warrensville Heights in the most efficient and expeditious manner possible. From Kimble Company About Your Rubbish Collection

Please place trash in bags. Don't place trash loose in Kimble cans. Loose trash creates loose debris on the ground in neighborhoods. Let's work to keep the City of Warrensville Heights clean. Only recycle material can be placed loose in recycle cans.

All mattresses, couches and chairs should be wrapped in plastic. Plastic can be picked up at The Warrensville Heights Service Dept.

Chipper Services ended on November 4, 2016. Any brush that is out must be tied in small bundles for trash pick-up.

The Service Department will continue to accept the following at the service garage at 19700 Miles Road.

Change to the Community's Electric Aggregation Supplier

Our community is a member of the North-east Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC), which selected FirstEnergy Solutions to provide electric generation service to eligible participants at a savings of 6% off the utility's generation rate for residents and 4% off for small businesses.

After negotiations between the groups failed, FirstEnergy Solutions provided notice to NOPEC that they would be ending their contract with them.

As a result, effective with your January or February meter read date, FirstEnergy Solutions will no longer be your electric generation supplier and you will return to your utility's standard offer unless you choose a supplier. It's important to note that you will not experience any interruption in your service.

Participants in the electric aggregation program will soon be receiving a letter in the mail notifying them of this change and explaining their options. If you have questions when you receive this letter, please call FirstEnergy Solutions' NOPEC Customer Care line at 1-888-254-9227, which is available weekdays from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm.

Q. Who can I call if I have questions about my contract with FirstEnergy Solutions?

A. You will receive a letter in the mail that will explain this change and your options. However, if you have questions after receiving this letter, please call FirstEnergy Solutions' NOPEC Customer Care line at 1-888-254-9227.

Q. If I don't have an electric supplier, will I be without power?

A. No. Once your contract with FirstEnergy Solutions ends, you will begin receiving your generation from the local electric utility. You will not have any interruption in service.

Q. How do I shop for a new supplier? Where do I find information on offers available to me?

A. If you're interested in shopping for a new generation supplier, you can visit the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio's website: energychoice.ohio.gov.

2016 Annual Summer Youth Employment Program Recap

Pipeline program seeks tomorrow's health care leaders from local high schools

Do you know a high school student dreaming of a career in health care who could benefit from intense encouragement, academic enrichment, hands-on practice and personal guidance from working professionals?

The Ohio University Heritage College of Osteopathic Medicine at Cleveland is offering a free pipeline program to students at Warrensville Heights High School and John F. Kennedy PACT High School to help them realize this vision. The program is designed to attract high school students from historically underrepresented backgrounds into health care and science fields and prepare them to succeed as doctors, nurses, researchers or whatever health career they choose.

The Cleveland Aspiring DOctors Pre-College Program is a comprehensive four-year program, offered at the Heritage College, Cleveland, on the campus of Cleveland Clinic South Pointe Hospital in Warrensville Heights. From 9th through 12th grade, students in the program visit the Heritage College campus each year, where they work with medical school faculty, staff and students to:

- Learn about osteopathic medicine and other health care career options
- Take part in hands-on, interactive clinical exercises
- Hear guest speakers from the medical and health professions
- Benefit from a STEM curriculum and student enrichment activities
- Receive assistance with the college application process

Learning materials are presented by practicing physicians and other health care professionals, including medical school faculty. Heritage College medical students serve as mentors to individual high schoolers in the program, answering questions about the medical school experience, helping with research projects, and offering guidance on the nuts and bolts of education planning.

It's well recognized that the United States faces a looming shortage of doctors and other health care professionals, especially in primary care. The Heritage College is deeply committed to filling this need, and to creating a more diverse health care workforce, by recruiting more students from historically underrepresented groups and economically disadvantaged backgrounds.

The Cleveland Aspiring Doctors Pre-College Program provides the boost that can move a talented high school student from "I want to be a doctor" to "I CAN be a doctor." BUILDING DEPARTMENT REMINDERS

Smoke Detectors

A lot of dwelling fires occur during the winter months. With this in mind please check all smoke detectors to make sure they are operating properly. Smoke detectors are required to be installed on all levels of the dwelling, including hallway outside of sleeping area, and in each bedroom.

Temporary Snow Fences

Temporary snow fences are permitted with the issuance of a Building Permit to be installed as long as such fence does not exceed 4 feet in height, and is not installed prior to October 1st. Such fence must be removed by May 1st.

Roof Systems

Harsh winter weather can take a toll on any roof system. During the winter months you could be dealing with unpredictable freeze/thaw cycles, snow accumulation, and high winds. Make sure all drains and gutters are clear of any debris that could impede the proper flow of water off of the roof system. Make sure you have a snow removal plan in place. A heavy snow load can have damaging effect on your roof if it reaches a load limit. It is strongly recommended that you have snow removal performed by a qualified professional.
