

Q & A with School Design Project Manager



Our new high school is on the way and construction progress can be seen daily. As the building goes up, you will notice unique elements of glass, brick and metal coming together. What is the inspiration behind some of these elements and how do they add to the student's everyday experience in and around the new high school? Steve Dzuranin, Project Manager from Moody Nolan architectural firm was asked about design elements in the new schools.

Q What were some of the most important design elements between the Middle and High School?


- The site acreage was limited, so the design of the new school had to be compact and efficient. Additionally, the existing science wing had to remain so we had to come up with an integrated design to connect the two parts seamlessly.
- It was important to create spaces that maintained separation between Middle School students and High School students. This way, each student body could create experiences within their own space. It was also important to make sure the facilities could accommodate community use, as well.



Q How do the different textural elements change the feel of the school?

- The various textural elements were meant to create visual interest so that the school did not have the traditional institutional aesthetic.

- The palate of colors were selected to create different identities between the Middle School, High School and the spaces for community use. You will instantly know where you are in the facilities by the signals these palates provide.
- The cantilevered room elements were inspired by the completed design of the new elementary school. It was important that the design elements be complementary between schools.



Q How does the design of both school projects create a cohesive school campus?

- Since the elementary school was first to be designed and built, a number of design elements, including materials that were shared between projects. The "community zone" is centrally located and flanked on either side by the Middle School Academic Core and the High School Academic Core.
- The main "loop" road will primarily serve as bus access. The Middle School and High School have separate entrances and the parent drop off/pick will occur in the central parking nearest to the building.
- The gym will incorporate the school colors and a graphic of the mascot. Moreover, there will be video boards on each end of the gym that will serve as scoreboards for athletic events.

Q What are aspects about the project design that the general public would not normally notice?

- This project is pursuing LEED Certification, so there are many high performing, energy efficient items incorporated in the design. This includes elements such as roof insulation, exterior wall assembly, mechanical & plumbing equipment. These special items add to the environmental responsibility of the buildings by using resources efficiently.

Vacant lots renewed with three new homes



Our city in partnership with the Cuyahoga Land Bank is making a difference in our community every day. This year, Warrensville Heights will see several new homes built on Longbrook Road. The Cuyahoga Land Bank strategically acquires properties beyond their useful life and rehabilitates them back to a useful state. As seen throughout Warrensville Heights, property assets can become green space, used for municipal or utility purposes or sold to private owners who meet acceptable standards. Some of these assets become beautiful new homes enhancing our community and increasing property values. The new homes will be the Cuyahoga Land Bank's first new construction project in Warrensville Heights and the city's first new construction project using scattered lots.




Artist rendering of one of three homes coming to Warrensville Heights

The two-story, 1,256 square foot colonial-style homes will have three bedrooms, 2.5 bathrooms and each are designed with a first-floor master suite with an attached bathroom and walk-in closet, a separate first-floor half bathroom, and an open layout. Homes that incorporate first-floor living amenities are ideally suited for a variety of households, including those

that are multi-generational or have disabled family members. Each home will have a detached one-car garage.

"We are always striving to improve our community, and this partnership with the Cuyahoga Land Bank will provide a modern housing product in Warrensville Heights to meet the needs of today's buyers," said Mayor Brad Sellers. "The first three homes will provide the impetus for future projects throughout our city."

"Warrensville Heights is a hidden gem, it is a wonderful place to live and work," said Dennis Roberts, Esq., Director of the Cuyahoga Land Bank's residential development activities. "Our goal is to continue to stimulate investment in the city by building new homes in accordance with the city's master plan."



The Cuyahoga Land Bank will break ground on the project this spring, and it is estimated the homes will be completed and listed for sale in the fall.

Councilwoman Andrea Mitchell stated, "More than 70 homes have been razed in the city since I became a member of Council in 2011. Of that total, 20 were in Ward 2 and 16 were in Brentwood, these new homes are a foundation for continued future development."

New Fire Truck is pushed-in station

Members of the Warrensville Heights Fire Department performed a traditional "push-in" on the city's new fire truck. Push-in ceremonies date back to the 1800s when departments used horse-drawn fire equipment. Horses had a hard time backing up, so equipment was pushed in by fire fighters. This is now tradition with new engines.

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Fireworks still "out" in Warrensville Heights

House Bill 172, which goes into effect July 1, will allow Ohioans to legally shoot off fireworks. It also allows municipalities to opt out of the new law and continue the bans on the use of fireworks. The City of Warrensville Heights is opting out of House Bill 172. That means the use of fireworks will continue to be banned in the City of Warrensville Heights. Therefore, no one will be allowed to set off fireworks in the city, including on private property. The only allowable use of fireworks within the city is for private or public displays of fireworks for events such as fairs, carnivals or other celebrations and requires written permission from the Fire Chief prior to the event. (Cod. Ords. 549.10, 549.11)

What the Center Provides and Offers

The Civic & Senior Center is a municipal facility whose primary mission is to provide services and activities for the adult community of Warrensville Heights. The Center currently offers a variety of activities and classes, which include: Aerobics, Ceramics, Crocheting/Knitting and more. We also provide social activities for our seniors such as an Annual Luncheon with the Mayor, trips to the Cleveland Playhouse, and programs based on the interest in the community.

Transportation

Building Department News

Building Permit Reminder

With the warmer weather, homeowners will start to do a lot of repairs on their properties and usually have questions for the Building Department in regards to what requires a permit and finding a contractor. Just like remodeling your kitchen requires a comprehensive plan, so does hiring a quality contractor. You will need to do your homework to protect your home and your finances when selecting a contractor to make sure they are reputable.

What is a Building Permit?

A building permit gives you legal permission to start the construction of a building project in accordance with the approved plans and specifications. Building Permits are very beneficial to you as the property owner. By working with our state certified building department, you will benefit from our knowledge of the state and local codes to insure is it built right, safe and will last. Safe construction practices help protect you, your family, your friends and your investment. Be sure to get our Building Department involved with your project, because we will be on your side to make sure all of the requirements are met.

When do I need a Building Permit?

The best way to find out if you need a permit is to contact our Building Department. Our staff is here to serve the public and will answer any questions that you may have. Be sure to discuss your plans with us before you begin construction to determine whether you need a permit, or if your project requires Planning Commission Architectural Review Board of Zoning Appeals, or Council approval first prior to submitting for permitting.

City Offices

Permits are required, but not limited to:

- New buildings
- Room additions
- Decks, garages, fences, storage sheds, roof replacement
- Renovations/ Alterations (garage conversions, basement remodeling, kitchen expansions, etc.)
- Driveway replacement, resurfacing
- Sidewalk and service walk replacement
- Windows
- New Electrical, Plumbing, and HVAC systems

What are the benefits of having a permit?

Increased value. Your home or business is an investment. If your construction project does not comply with the codes, the value of our investment could be reduced. Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections. The City may require work performed and concealed without permits to be exposed or removed, leading to costly expenses and time.

Protection. A property owner who can show that code requirements were strictly and consistently met, has a strong ally if something were to happen with the installation. Ensures

Safety. A permit also allows our department to protect the public's, safety and welfare by reducing the potential hazards of unsafe construction. By following the State and Local code guidelines, your completed project will meet minimum standards of construction and will be less likely to cause injury you and your family.

How to I find a Licensed Contractor?

Our department maintains a list of licensed and bonded contractors who have registered with the city. Contractors who register with the city must provide a surety bond and certificate of insurance. The contractors insurance must also name the city as an additional insured in the event a claim has to be filed. It shall be at the discretion and the responsibility of the property owner to require a Performance Bond to be submitted by the contractor guaranteeing protection against possible losses in the event they fail to perform or is unable to deliver the project per the established private contract.

Can I pull a Homeowners Permit?

Homeowners Permits can be pulled for general construction only (roofs, concrete, fences, siding, storage sheds etc.)

Planning and Zoning

The City's new Zoning Code was passed by City Council November 4, 2020. This update was long overdue due to the fact that a lot of the previous codes went back as far as 1931. Our effort with the new update was to make it more user friendly and readable for our residents and businesses. Two areas of change we made to expedite the process of owners pulling permits, is Decks and Storage Tool Sheds. Under the previous code: a resident would have to appear before Planning Commission and City Council for approval prior to pulling the building permit. Under the new code;

1. Storage Tool Sheds, 100 square feet in area or less, can be approved internally in the Building Department with the permit application without meeting attendance.

2. Decks, 150 square feet or less, can be approved internally in the Building Department with the permit application without meeting attendance.

Property Maintenance

The City of Warrensville Heights codified ordinances require that all exterior property areas be maintained in good repair and free from unsafe, unhealthy, blighting, and deteriorating conditions. This includes the home exterior, grass, shrubs, fences and accessory structures. With this in mind this city will conduct our annual Exterior Property Maintenance Inspection Program on the following streets for 2022. Our inspections will be conducted from the public right of way.

Officer Darrin Hunt served with the Cleveland Police Department for three years. And also, Officer Eric Cvanciger who served with Highland Heights Police Department for seven years. Even with these new additions, we are still looking to add more officers to the Warrensville Heights Police Department. We will be conducting another round of emergency hires in hope of bringing on five new police officers this year.

Warrensville Heights is always looking for the best technology to keep our neighborhoods safe. In the Winter Magazine, I talked about a system that reads license plates in key areas around the city, to find those who may have perpetrated a crime. Now, we are installing another revolutionary system.

Shot Spotter is a proactive detection system to detect gunshots. The system can instantaneously identify a sound and determine if it is a gunshot, as opposed to a firecracker or car backfire. The system triangulates the sound with multiple monitors and tells police dispatchers in seconds where the shot took place, allowing law enforcement to be informed and respond immediately. Because most callers cannot determine a direction a gunshot was heard, many perpetrators are not found. This system is a game changer.

This is some of the new technology we have implemented in Warrensville Heights.
