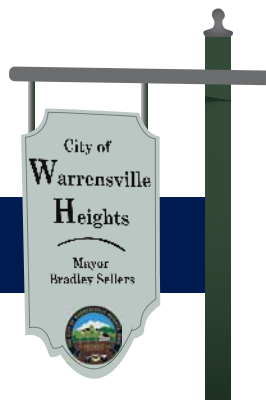

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The Mayor's Message



As with Fall, changes happen

Soon, the tree-lined streets of our community will burst into their annual display of color. As we enjoy this seasonal transformation, we take time to reflect on the moments that made this past summer truly memorable.

On May 26th, we held one of the largest Memorial Day Parades to date. Sixty-three groups marched, danced, cheered and sang as supporters lined the streets. The post-parade ceremony featured heartfelt speeches, including a moving address by our Grand Marshal, U.S. Air Force veteran Steven Boyd.

In May, Cleveland State University Center for Emergency Preparedness presented a Fire Station Feasibility Study to the public. The study evaluated the current two-station model versus a single, centralized fire station.

It considered factors such as response times, costs, and the efficiency of housing all equipment in one location. The study ultimately recommended the development of one centralized fire station. To read the full study, scan the QR code.



Our Summer Festival was moved a week earlier this year on August 9th and 10th. The plan worked and it was another highlight of the year, drawing residents together for two days of fun and celebration. I would like to thank my staff, entertainers, volunteers and more for helping make 2025 a resounding success. We're already looking forward to next year!

Up next is the always-popular Trunk-or-Treat event in October. Thanks to the efforts of students from Ohio University Heritage College of Osteopathic Medicine and our many community partners, this event promises to offer a safe and festive Halloween experience for all.

Key roads were repaired and resurfaced and additional lighting was installed in several areas to improve safety. Partnerships with developers will soon bear fruit as several new housing projects are in the planning stages, while others will soon be reality. Economic development remains a top priority. We are welcoming several new businesses and retailers to the city, including Burlington and QDOBA. On August 9–10, the 2025 Summer Festival united thousands of community members at Green Road Park for an unforgettable celebration filled with live music, delicious food, exciting rides, games, and plenty of fun.

Countywide Housing Study and Local Leaders Spotlight Housing Challenges



A newly released housing study by the Center for Economic Development at Cleveland State University was unveiled at the Warrensville Heights Civic & Senior Center, with Cuyahoga County Executive Chris Ronayne in attendance. The study provides a comprehensive overview of the evolving housing landscape across

Cuyahoga County—including a focused look at Warrensville Heights.

Commissioned by the County's Office of Housing and Community Development, the study identifies key challenges such as housing affordability, aging housing stock, and uneven recovery from the 2007 foreclosure crisis. While some areas of the county are experiencing renewed growth, many predominantly minority communities—such as Warrensville Heights—continue to face limited new housing development and rising rents. Still, there are encouraging signs of progress, particularly within the city.

"Over the past decade, Warrensville Heights has made strong strides in improving housing—and we're now seeing those efforts pay off.



We're excited about the many new development opportunities on the horizon," said Mayor Brad Sellers.

The study calls for stronger coordination between programs, thoughtful policy reforms and increased investment to support equity and housing stability across all communities.



These themes were at the forefront of the Housing Matters event, held on July 11 at 9:00 AM at the Warrensville Heights Civic & Senior Center, located at 4567 Green Road. The event brought together local and county leaders—including County Executive Chris Ronayne, Mayor Brad Sellers, and Superintendent Donald Jolly, and other leaders—for a robust conversation on affordable housing challenges and opportunities across the region. A strong community turnout helped fuel meaningful discussion on how data-driven planning can shape a more inclusive and resilient housing future.

Greetings Neighbors. Autumn is upon us, school bells are ringing, and as of August 13th, our younger community members are back in class. Please keep an eye out for students heading to and from school—we all need to stay vigilant for their safety.

IMPORTANT: Passing a school bus with signals activated (lights and stop sign) is a misdemeanor, with a mandatory court appearance.

In addition, per code 333.03 (A)(1) exceeding— 20 miles per hour— the posted school zone speed limit is a first-degree misdemeanor, with fines starting at \$165 and a mandatory court appearance.

In October, The Friendly City will celebrate its 65th anniversary! Warrensville Heights was chartered as a city on October 2, 1960. The History and Archives Committee is preparing a meaningful and educational way to mark this milestone.

Also, the Fall Ward 2 Community Meeting will take place in October. It will include helpful information and plenty of “News to Use.” Stay tuned for the time, date and location of both events!

Building Department News

This past spring through fall, the Building Department conducted its annual Exterior Property Maintenance Inspection Program. This year's inspections included residential streets: Parkton, Garden, Cherrywood, Butternut, Marvin, Aurora, Green, Miles, Annette, W. Sunset, E. Sunset, W. Ridgewood, E. Ridgewood, Vera, Richmond, Springvale, Berrimore, Joyce, Longleaf, Merrygold, Timberlane, Hathaway, and Halifax.

If you own a residential property and received a property maintenance violation, you may be eligible to apply for our Exterior Maintenance Grant Program to help offset some of the repair costs. For program guidelines and the application, please contact our Community and Economic Development Department at 216-587-1450 or visit the city's website. In addition to the Exterior Property Maintenance Inspection Program, we also conduct regular inspections of commercial properties and apartment complexes.

Tree Removal & Regulations

This past spring, the City amended Chapter 943, Tree Removal & Regulations, which pertains to dead and dangerous trees on both private and public properties. Some of the amendments include provisions for Authority to Inspect Premises, Notice of Violation, and Removal of Trees by the City in the Public Right-of-Way.

The City has entered into a Personal Services Agreement with an arborist who will be contacted to determine whether a tree is dead or dangerous when a complaint is received. In addition, the City plans to go out to bid to contract with a tree company to handle the removal of trees deemed dead and dangerous.

Fall is an ideal time to start preparing your property—both inside and out—for the upcoming winter months. Here are some helpful tips.

Clean and Repair Gutters

Check your gutters and downspouts to make sure they are properly secured, clean, and clear of any debris. If your gutters and downspouts are not properly secured when heavy snow arrives, they can break loose from the house. If they are clogged, water can back up and cause damage to your roof and interior walls.

Inspect Roof

Do a complete walk-around of your property, checking for any missing or damaged shingles that could allow moisture to enter. Replace any that are compromised.

Smoke Detectors / Carbon Monoxide Alarms

Ensure your property has smoke detectors and carbon monoxide alarms. Smoke detectors must be installed on each level of the house, in hallways outside sleeping areas, and inside each bedroom. Battery-operated smoke alarms are permitted in existing dwellings, but new construction requires hardwired units in the same locations.

It is strongly recommended to install a carbon monoxide alarm in your home. These should be centrally located outside each separate sleeping area, near the bedrooms. Carbon monoxide alarms are mandatory in new construction.

Driveway Repairs

Waterproofing your driveway is important to prevent future damage and expense. Repair all cracks in your asphalt or concrete driveway. These cracks can fill with rain or melted snow, and when the water freezes, it expands, causing frost heave that results in even more damage.

Seal Doors and Windows

Gaps around your doors and windows can significantly increase your winter heating costs. Seal all gaps with caulking or weather-stripping to improve energy efficiency.

Heating System

Have your furnace or boiler serviced by a licensed professional. Check and replace any dirty furnace filters. If you have a fireplace, have your chimney inspected by a licensed professional to ensure there is no creosote buildup, which can be a fire hazard.

Chipper Service

Chipper service will end on September 30th.

Leaf Service

Leaf pickup will take place October 1st to December 15th or the first snowfall. Leaves mixed with grass or branches will not be picked up. After December 15th, or a snowfall, leaves will need to be bagged as trash.

Trash Pickup Changes Thanksgiving Week

During Thanksgiving week trash pickup will be paused for Thanksgiving Day. So Thursday's pickup will move to Friday.

Trash Pickup Changes Christmas Week

Regular trash collection will take place on Wednesday, December 24th. Thursday, December 25th pickup will be rescheduled to Friday, December 26th due to the holiday.

Remember, all mattresses and cloth furniture must be wrapped in plastic before placing on tree lawn for disposal. Bags are available at the Service Department. Carpet is to be cut in 3-foot sections and put in trash bags.

Community and Economic Development News

This September marks three years since I began my tenure with the City of Warrensville Heights—a milestone highlighting the meaningful progress made and the continued dedication of the Community and Economic Development Department to serving our community. During this time, the department has gained a comprehensive understanding of the city's economic landscape and worked collaboratively with businesses, developers, residents, and community partners. It has been a great summer of growth and activity, further strengthening our efforts. Guided by the Mayor's leadership, our efforts remain firmly aligned with his vision to enhance the overall health, wellness, and prosperity of Warrensville Heights through strategic and impactful development initiatives.

New Business Development

Since the release of our spring newsletter in March 2025, Warrensville Heights has welcomed a wave of new businesses—an exciting sign of the city's growing appeal to entrepreneurs and investors alike. These new additions reflect our continued economic momentum and vitality. Businesses include:

Primary Care Solutions, A Promise to Care East, New Day Health Services, Integrated Automation Systems, Harwood Motors, Precision Diagnostic Imaging, Young Scholars Leadership Academy Childcare, K-11 Canine Care, 1st Health Choice Adult Daycare, Serenity Health & Wellness Corporation, Empowering Integrated Care Solutions LLC.

Marshalls in Harvard Park recently relocated just two doors down accommodating the upcoming opening of a new Burlington store—another exciting addition to Warrensville Heights. In other development news, Heinen's Distribution Center, located at 20101 South Miles Road, is set to undergo another expansion with the construction of a 54,344 sq. ft. addition to one of its existing warehouse buildings.

Housing Development

Affordable housing continues to be a complex and evolving challenge—both locally and nationwide. In Warrensville Heights, we remain committed to working with developers to provide a variety of housing options, including multi-family, single-family, and senior housing. This fall, several residential projects will break ground, marking significant progress in expanding housing opportunities. These include four new homes on vacant infill lots in the Brentwood community and one new single-family home on Amherst Road. Looking ahead, additional developments are scheduled through the second quarter of next year. Notably, a 186-unit, multi-family project is set to begin construction in late spring or early summer of 2026, located behind the YMCA and the Warrensville Heights branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library. These initiatives are part of our broader strategy to transform vacant land into vibrant, livable neighborhoods for our residents.

Grand Opening and Free Gift Card Contest

Burlington's grand opening at Harvard Park Shopping Center in Warrensville Heights is Friday, October 3 at 9:00 AM. A ribbon-cutting ceremony will take place 15–20 minutes prior. The first 100 customers on both Friday and Saturday will receive a \$10 bonus card.

Also, Clean Express Carwash, opening late winter at Richmond and Emery, is giving away a "Year of Free Car Washes" gift card to a Warrensville Heights resident—stay tuned to the city website for details on how to enter.

Infrastructure Improvements

1. Granada Boulevard: Due to rising costs of goods and services, reconstruction and repair work along Granada Boulevard is being completed in phases. The upcoming Phase VI will advance the project further south, approaching—but not yet reaching—the intersection of Emery Road and Granada Boulevard. This phase is scheduled to begin in September 2025.
2. Safe Routes to School (SRTS): In collaboration with the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), this ongoing initiative—more than five years in the making—is set to begin construction in September 2025. Planned improvements include enhanced pedestrian crosswalks in targeted areas, new signage, and sidewalks along the south side of Clarkwood Parkway. This project aims to create a safer environment for students traveling to and from school.

POLICE, FIRE & PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT LEVIES

The Cost

The three levies combined will cost homeowners \$31.00 annually for every \$100,000 of home value, equivalent to \$2.58 per month. When estimating the cost for your home, base your estimate on the current valuation.



★ **Are these New Levies?** No, all three levies are five-year RENEWALS.

★ **How long have these levies been in place?** The levies have been in place over 20 years.

★ **How much will the levies bring in over five years?** \$1.05 Million.

★ **Who votes?** All Warrensville Heights residents.

What does the Permanent Improvement Levy do?

This levy generates \$70,000 per year, totaling \$350,000 over five years.

The funds are used to make citywide capital improvements for repairs, maintenance and enhancements to the city's existing and future capital assets.

What do the Police & Fire Levies do?

These two levies generate a combined estimate of \$140,000 per year, totaling \$700,000 over five years.

These funds are used to support our police and fire departments efforts to purchase public safety equipment, vehicles and a portion of their pension.
