As you know, we have had quite an eventful year. I hope each of you attended our Annual Lighting Ceremony. It was a great event filled with sweet treats, entertainment and family fun. If you missed it, you can see the beautiful display every evening in front of City Hall. It is a little bittersweet as this was our final lighting ceremony at this building. Next year – we will be at our new home on Richmond Road.

I want to thank you for your continued support during the election. As a result, I am pleased and thankful that I will be continuing my service to this community. In accordance with my strategic vision plan, great things are in the works, such as developing the former Zayre's site.

Congratulations to council members – Dorise Hagwood, Ward 1, Andrea Mitchell, Ward 2, and Walter Stewart, Ward 4 on their re-elections to the Warrensville Heights City Council. Lastly, I would like to congratulate and welcome our new School Board Member – Earl Darren Roberts on a successful campaign and current members Ray A. Freeman and Traci Mitchell on their re-elections.

Clarkwood Parkway is literally changing daily. You can now see the shell of classrooms and a full court gym in the new elementary school. The next big part of the project underway will be the second floor.

Also, the Eastwood Park renovation project is nearly complete with the exercise equipment, fencing, lighting and labyrinth all intact. The final touches that will occur in the spring are landscaping, a dedication rock for the Brentwood Foundation, rubber safety surfacing (shredded rubber under equipment) and game tables and park benches. Health and wellness is very important to me and I am looking forward to all of the health benefits this park will bring to residents of the community, the employees at South Pointe Hospital as well as my own administrative staff.

I am pleased to announce that K9 Officer Jaq Vom Schmidt was appointed at the first City Council meeting in December. I read the Oath of Office to him and he was given a command to 'speak' (bark) confirming he will fulfill his civic duties to the best of his ability. His paw print was captured in ink for his signature on the Oath of Office, along with his handler, making it all official. Jaq is the city's sixth K9 officer and the first K9 during my tenure as mayor, making it the first time I have personally sworn in a K9 officer. This is an exciting addition to our police force, as there has not been a K9 officer on the force in over ten years.

An important issue becoming more prevalent during this time of year is the importance of protecting your family from carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide is a dangerous gas that is odorless, colorless and most times undetectable. Please make sure you have detectors in your home, placed in

the proper areas in order to remain safe and unharmed. In addition, regulations suggest smoke detectors should be placed in each bedroom, the hallway outside of sleeping areas and on all levels of your

home. If you need additional detectors, they can be purchased at your local hardware store.

Ms. Walker served as the Chief of Staff under Mayors Marcia Fudge, the late Clinton Hall and Bradley D. Sellers.

During Ms. Walker's tenure as Chief of Staff, she played a critical role in helping the city adapt to significant policy ordinances, bargaining negotiations with several of our Unions, changes in our municipality and Economic Development achievements, all with firm leadership. In this role, she served as a champion for establishing new partnerships within Cuyahoga County and the State of Ohio which contributed significantly to our culture of regulatory compliance.

In 2016, Ms. Walker was appointed by Mayor Sellers to become the Senior Advocacy Liaison Director, providing the delivery of services and support that will improve and promote the quality of life and personal choice for older Ohioans, their families and the caregivers.

To celebrate this well-deserved achievement, on Thursday, October 31st, a standing room only farewell luncheon was given in her honor at The Warrensville Heights Civic & Senior Center.

The luncheon began with a proclamation read from Congresswoman Marcia Fudge, Representative for Ohio's 11th congressional district, words of well wishes from Councilwoman Dorise Hagwood and Councilman Stanley Anderson. A large number of attendees were from members of her sorority, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc., her church family from Bethany Christian, the Warrensville Heights Senior Club past and present presidents, family, dear friends and several departmental

CRAFTING CERAMICS ONE FRIDAY AT A TIME

Longtime resident teaches classes in the city for nearly five decades



Evelyn Mosley, a quick-witted, fun and loving 90 year old has been a resident of the Friendly City since 1968. She is a walking history book witnessing and experiencing many changes in the neighborhood, however, her love for teaching the art of ceramics will remain in her heart forever.

Mosley has always been a crafty person. She started out knitting which led her to explore tailoring, dressmaking, crocheting and millinery classes while her children were in school. "Every time I'd make a suit or dress, I'd make a hat to match. I've always been creative...I'd make mother-daughter dresses for my daughter and I," Mosley says. Her zest for creativity continued and soon after completing a ceramics class, she quickly mastered the art of ceramics and began teaching in the evenings from 1971 to 1993 at the Senior High School.

In 1993, when the Civic and Senior Center opened, former mayor, Raymond Grabow, expressed that he wanted to offer classes for seniors. Mrs. Mosley's husband Levi, a Warrensville Heights Councilman for 16 years, recommended that his wife teach ceramics – which once upon a time was the only class at the Center. Shortly thereafter, one of the most successful businesses in the city at the time, Bass Chevrolet, supported





the Center by donating a kiln. "I started out with a kiln!" Mosley exclaimed excitedly.

Fast forward to today, Mother, or Mother Mosley, as her students affectionately call her, exhibits nothing but a fun and vibrant energy throughout class. Students appreciate her passion as she leads them through the steps to create their own masterpieces.

The process of creating ceramic pieces, also known as "bisque ware", can be a long one – especially if it's large with many colors and details. Typically when a student is almost finished with their piece, they ask her what else needs to be done. In particular, a student finishing a kangaroo asked "what else do I need to do, Mother?" and Mosley suggested she "drybrush" the feet, ears and tail – a technique that uses darker colors to shade an area or make the appearance of fur come to life. When Mosley chose a deeper color, the student hesitated and said "you don't think it will be too dark?" – Mosley quickly responded, "trust me, you might like it!" with her contagious smile and famous wink. Another student explained that she doesn't have

a steady hand anymore, so she wants Mrs. Mosley to paint the eyebrows and lipstick on her piece.

As the bisque ware is nearing completion, one of the last steps is to 'fire' it in the kiln for several hours. By next class, the piece is ready for the finishing touches, students can choose rhinestones, eyeballs, or anything else to embellish it before taking it home.

Class is family-oriented with laughter and personal conversations shared throughout. It has become a popular opportunity for residents to get together and fellowship with one another. Mrs. Mosley's class is so well loved, students come back for repeat sessions to make more art. She exclaims affectionately, "I love my ceramics – people in my class love me and I love them." In fact, at the end of each class, Mother Mosley tells every student that she loves them and to be blessed.

Naturally, most of the décor in Mosley's home are her own pieces, including items like serving dishes and bowls, coffee cups, lamps, clocks and much more. Even though ceramics is a passion of Mosley's, she says "it's a dying art. People want to just see it on the shelf and buy it, they don't want to sit down and make it."

The class is very popular, with many seasoned vets, but if you are new to the painting and ceramics world, give it a try. Mrs. Mosley and her assistant, Helen, will guide you through with lots of help along the way.

Classes are held in eight week sessions from March through November on Fridays from 10:00 a.m. to noon. Mosley feels ceramics is a "good way to end the week...you get over here and forget about the time." All skill levels are welcome. Call the Civic and Senior Center at 216.587.1250 for further details or to register.

Mrs. Mosley has three children, one daughter and two sons, eight grandchildren and four great grandchildren. Next time you visit the Civic Center, look around on the shelves and cases throughout the main lobby, she made ALL of the artwork! [WHI](#)

100 Business Forum

The Office of Community & Economic Development hosted its largest business forum on September 4 at Corporate College East, designed to reach and empower 100 local businesses. The forum provided information on the latest market trends, how to do business with Amazon, business funding and unique tax abatement programs available.

The event was a huge success and received immediate, positive feedback from many of the 115 attendees.

Eastwood Fitness & Wellness Park

The city hosted a ground breaking ceremony on October 15 for its new innovative fitness & wellness park that was birthed as a collaborative funded effort through a public-private partnership with the City of Warrensville Heights, Cleveland Clinic South Pointe Hospital, Cuyahoga County Department of Development and The Brentwood Foundation.

The park is scheduled to open in the spring, details about the grand opening will be announced.

Fire Department

The Warrensville Heights Fire Department hosted the State Mobile Fire Trailer Workshop. There were three days of classroom instruction and hands-on training, which included a live fire evolution that required our firefighters to wear their full turnout gear.

The local communities that participated in the training were Highland Hills, North Randall and Woodmere. We also had participants from the Warrensville Heights High School Fire Academy.

Great News! The Warrensville Heights Fire Department was awarded a \$140,000 grant from the Assistance to Firefighter Grant (AFG) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). These funds will be used to purchase Self-contained Breathing Apparatus units (SCBA).

A warm welcome to Kyle Witczak, our newest Warrensville Heights Fire Department member. Kyle brings ten years of experience as a registered nurse from Metro General Hospital and Chagrin Falls Fire Department.

Civic and Senior Center

The Center is a municipal facility with the primary mission to provide services and activities for the senior and adult community of Warrensville Heights.

The Center has rooms in the Civic Center as well as the Chateaux of Emery Woods available for rental by residents on Friday evenings and all day on Saturdays for community or adult events.

What the Center Provides/Offers

The Center currently offers a variety of activities and classes. These include: Aerobics, Ballroom Dancing, Beginning Bridge, Ceramics, Crafts, Crocheting/Knitting, Painting, Senior Line Dancing, Senior Bid Whist and more. There are also opportunities for seniors to go on group outings to the Cleveland Playhouse, Karamu Theater and other locations depending on interest.

Transportation

Transportation Services are provided for seniors 60+ years of age for medical appointments and grocery shipping from 9:00 a.m. until 12:30 p.m., based on availability.

Senior Club

The Senior Club (for Warrensville Heights residents 60 years and older) meets twice a month and allows neighbors to meet and socialize with one another. The club has an annual picnic and plans other activities that are informative and fun. Each month during their meetings, club members receive updates on the current affairs in the City from the Mayor, City Council, Board of Education and departmental directors

Strategic Initiatives

On Wednesday, October 30, 2019, The City of Warrensville Heights hosted its 2nd series of How to Start and Sustain a Business workshops: Starting a Business in Ohio and Getting Credit Ready. Shashonna Duckworth, Executive Director of the Urban League Small Business Development Center facilitated the information packed workshops for over 35 engaged and enthusiastic entrepreneurs. The participants ranged in ages and pursuits, but it was wonderful to have among those who aspire to build wealth and get business ready a 6th grader from Warrensville Heights Middle School. Her goal is to start a business to build her own computer system – it is never too early or too late to start a business in Ohio.

Building Department

The City of Warrensville Heights has a Residential Rental Property Registration Ordinance which requires property owners to register every building/dwelling unit within the city that is available for rent, annually. This ordinance does not apply to licensed rest homes, convalescent care facilities, licensed group homes, nursing homes, hotels or motels. This winter, the Building Department will mail annual rental registration applications to rental property owners. Owners will have until spring 2020 to submit their applications. The fees for registration are as follows:

Single Family Residential: \$200

Two-Family Residential: \$100 per unit

Condominium: \$100 per unit

Multi-Family: \$50 per unit

Winter Property Maintenance Tips

Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Many dwelling fires occur during the winter months. With this in mind, please check all smoke detectors to make sure they are operating properly. Smoke detectors are required to be installed on all levels of the dwelling, including the hallway outside of sleeping areas and in each bedroom. At a minimum, carbon monoxide detectors should be installed on each level of the home, ideally on any level with fuel burning appliances and outside of sleeping areas. See manufacturing instructions for proper placement.

Furnaces, Boilers, and Hot Water Tanks

Furnaces, boilers, and hot water tanks should be serviced by a licensed and bonded HVAC contractor annually. The technician will conduct a physical inspection to make sure there is no corrosion or leaks as well as turn the unit on to make sure it is not emitting any hazardous gases. A permit is required for the installation of a new furnace, boiler, or hot water tank.

Temporary Snow Fences

Temporary snow fences are permitted to be installed with the issuance of a Building Permit. The fence cannot exceed 4 feet in height and must be removed by May 1st.

Roof Systems

Harsh winter weather can take a toll on any roof system. During the winter months, you could be dealing with unpredictable freeze/thaw cycles, snow accumulation, and high winds. Make sure all drains and gutters are clear of any debris that could impede the proper flow of water from the roof system. It is important to have a snow removal plan in place. A heavy snow load can have a damaging effect on your roof if it reaches a load limit and cause ice-dams to form. The installation of heat cables can create a channel for water to flow and help prevent some damage.

Water Pipes

Because water expands as it freezes, pipes can burst causing water damage and costly repairs. Industry experts recommend installing pipe insulation and allowing faucets to drip slightly when temperatures get below freezing.

Several officers & dispatchers purchased baseball caps, T-shirts and hooded sweatshirts for the month with part of the proceeds totaling \$260 going towards the foundation. In addition, officers had the opportunity to donate \$25 for the month to wear either of the items while on duty. In support of the men and women of the Warrensville Heights Police Department who participated in this charitable lifesaving event, I matched their donations of \$175 to total donations from the police department to \$610 for the Susan G. Service Department

Leaf Pickup

Leaf pickup will continue until December 31st – afterwards all materials must be bagged for trash pickup. Plastic bags can be picked up at the service garage.

Chipper Service

Chipper service ended October 1st and will only be available on an emergency basis.

Rubbish Pickup

Please wrap mattresses and cloth/leather furniture in plastic.

All paint, cooking oils, tires and computer/electronic equipment can be dropped off at the Service Garage between 8:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m., Monday - Friday

All leaves and yard waste should be bagged for trash pickup.
